Linguistic - the words you choose to use and how you bring these together through speech.




Cognitive - how you organise your thoughts, explain your ideas clearly, and ask questions to better understand things.

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THE ORACY **COMPASS**

The skills we need to speak, listen, and communicate effectively vary depending on the situation. Explaining a scientific concept to experts, for example, calls on very different skills than telling a funny story to friends.

The Oracy Framework helps identify and teach the specific skills your students need in different situations. To use it well, it's important to consider the purpose, context, and audience for talk in any given task.

To support this, the Oracy Compass, included with each challenge, outlines the purpose, audience and context for talk, along with the specific skills from the Framework that students need to consider as they navigate each oracy challenge.



How should you use your voice, body language, and facial expressions in this specific context? How might these change depending on the audience or purpose of your talk?



Jou talking to? Linguistic What kind of language, vocabulary, and level of formality will work well in this situation? How might your choice of words change depending on who you are speaking to and why?



How will you connect with your audience or work effectively Social-enorion with others in this situation? How can you listen carefully. respond thoughtfully, and read the room to make sure everyone feels heard and understood?



How can you organise and explain your ideas clearly? How might your choice of content change depending on the purpose and audience?

We've also shared a separate file including a blank template that you can print to map the oracy skills needed for specific tasks in your classroom. This can be shared with your students to help develop a shared language for oracy. Sometimes a particular skill will need explicit teaching; other times, simply drawing students' attention to it will be enough.
